STATE OF THE SCHOOL REPORT: November 2024

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Marquette Catholic School is dedicated to academic excellence formed in the teachings of Jesus Christ and the Sacramental life of the Catholic Church. Marquette nurtures each child's growth in knowledge, faith and Christian stewardship fostering a life of holiness and virtue.





THE BIG MOVE

The old Marquette school building, located adjacent to Holy Spirit Church on 3rd Street South, has been an icon of this community for over 100 years. It has served the community well by fostering leaders, strong families, and community minded citizens through that time. We are grateful for the generations of families that built and maintained our building for over a century. A final "walkthough" weekend was held at the end of August for people to say good-bye to the building. This year, we begin a new chapter as we move our Catholic school heritage into a new, beautiful, spacious, safe, and inviting building!

Four years ago, in response to the now certain steam conversion, an assessment was done on the Marquette school building; the estimate to bring it up to code was over \$6.6 million. As discernment began as to what the next step should be, the Blue Cross Blue Shield building in Virginia became available. A capital campaign, "Put Out Into The Deep" was put into place, and through the prayers, sacrifice, and dedication of so many, the building was purchased. Middle School (grades 5-8) moved in August 2023 and used the North building during the 2023-24 school year while the South building was renovated. Preschool and Elementary grades were moved over this summer. All grades PreK-8 are now under one roof. So many volunteers and staff have worked hard to create chapels, playgrounds, library spaces and more for our new school building.

We thank the Lord for his goodness and the Holy Spirit's guidance in this move, and we thank everyone who GAVE so GENEROUSLY through time, talent, and treasure to make this herculean move happen!







NEW BUILDING

Living, learning, and operating in our new facility has brought about many changes. With the introduction of new spaces come new procedures and rules, which we are learning together as a community.

We extend our heartfelt gratitude to the numerous partners who contributed to the creation of this building: contractors, workers, architects, inspectors, and volunteers who ensured our space is safe, secure, and student-friendly.

- Ridge **Transportation** Rock continues to be our partner for student transportation, providing services every Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday. Please note that due early release Wednesdays, transportation is not available on that day. For families needing a later pickup, our aftercare program continues to be available, operating from 3:15 PM to 5:30 PM.
- We are pleased to have INAC as our provider for the School Nutrition Program. Their flexibility in offering cold and ala carte menu options has been invaluable this year. We look forward to returning a hot lunch menu when a commercial kitchen is added.
- Our maintenance staff has continued to learn and adapt to operating in the new space and unique features of our building. Their commitment to keeping every nook and cranny neat and orderly ensures a safe and welcoming environment for our students and staff.

Thank you to everyone in our community for your continued support as we navigate this exciting journey together.



The work of acquiring and renovating the new school building has been a blessing of the Holy Spirit.

We began our discussions with Blue Cross Blue Shield (tenant) and WP Carey (owner) about about a year and a half before we actually purchased the building. Holy Spirit entered into an agreement with both BCBS and WP Carey to purchase the building for \$2.9 million in November of 2022.

Shortly thereafter Steier, a team of professional fundraisers, was hired to study the feasibility of a capital campaign and they concluded we could raise \$2.8 – \$3.6 million. The Campaign started in earnest in January of 2023 and donations began coming in. After obtaining lending from St. Joseph's in Gilbert, St. Anthony's in Ely, and Resurrection Church in Eveleth, along with substantial support from Catholic Finance Corporation, a non-profit organization established by the Archdiocese to lend to churches, all the pieces were in place to make the purchase which happened on March 31, 2023. After closing costs, legal costs, surveying and environmental assessments, and real estate taxes, the total building cost was \$3,066,519.

The renovation was somewhat delayed by engineering for the project, project uncertainties, and renovation budget considerations. These were ironed out and the project was split into two phases. Phase 1 of the project began in early November 2023 and was largely completed by June of this year. Projects such as the moving of the playground, the moving of all the furniture from the old building, completing the installation of internet components, and obtaining and installing cabinetry and lockers followed the completion of the renovation. The delay in beginning the project actually helped in that capital campaign contributions built up enough that we were able to meet our renovation obligations without any problems.

Phase 2 of the project has been divided into three phases, the first being the completion of a commercial kitchen facility this coming summer (2025) so that hot lunches can be served in our lunchroom. Renovations beyond that are dependent on future funding and would include additional classrooms and a gym space.



FINANCES

These past five years have presented new financial challenges.

- 2019-21: The year COVID began and the following year, Marquette lost \$36K and 50K respectively. Substantial COVID related grants resulted in a healthy \$284K surplus.
- **2021-2023:** Increased enrollments, as well as adding a second preschool section and 7th and 8th grade, required additional staffing, administration, textbook and classroom supplies.
- 2023-24: The cost to operate the school at two different locations increased due to higher utility, insurance, and staffing costs. Additionally, the success of our fundraising efforts was diminished by 100K from previous years, due in part to the capital campaign competing for donors.
- 2024-25: This current school year the school is anticipating a much smaller loss than previous years, but still a loss.

Efforts over the next two years are to further control spending, to recover the success of our fundraising efforts and our donation revenue, to increase tuition revenue and to right size classes without compromising the quality of education and to improve the operating efficiency of the facility.

Breakdown of numbers:


- Total operation cost of the school is \$1.2 million (based on 24-25 budget numbers)
- Cost of educating one child is \$6,000 (based on current enrollment)
- Average student pays \$3200 in tuition (when sibling discounts, employee discounts, and prepay discounts are taken into consideration)
- Approximately 15 students enrolled in a class cover one full-time teacher (average cost of one teaching salary plus benefits)
- 46% of the school budget is paid for by fundraising, donations, and parish supports


MARQUETTE'S COST PER STUDENT (Based on 2023-24)

*MCS receives some state funding for non-religious textbooks, compensation to cover the school nurse salary, Title 1 funds to cover a part-time Title teacher, and Title 2 funds to cover some professional development.

To put the cost of education in perspective, below is information from the U.S. Census Bureau on the cost of education among Minnesota public schools.










LEADERSHIP

There are three main leadership bodies that assist the Pastor in governing our school.

NEW SCHOOL LEADERSHIP TEAM:

The leadership team was put in place this past April during the interview process for a new principal. A team approach allows all of us to bring our gifts and put them at the service of our school through the lens of faith, academics, and operations. **Fr. Brandon Moravitz** serves as the Pastor, **Tami Ward** serves as Principal, **Jake Rosandich** serves as Assistant Principal, **Tisha Frost** serves as Accreditation Specialist, and **Deacon Bill Hafdahl** serves as a financial consultant. Tami Ward and Jake Rosandich take the helm and run the day to day operations at the school. Tisha Frost and Deacon Bill Hafdahl help with the various paperwork and tasks that need to happen behind the scenes. As a leadership team, we all feel strongly that the Holy Spirit has called us here to help Marquette fully live out its mission.

A.C.C.E. BOARD

ACCE stands for Advisory Committee on Catholic Education.

Marquette's ACCE board has nine members. The Pastor and Principal are ex-officio and non-voting members. Then there are seven other members who serve 3 year terms. Terms can be renewed once for a total of 6 years. Board members are appointed by the Pastor and School Leadership Team.

The ACCE board is not a governing body like a typical public school board. They serve to advise the Pastor and School Leadership Team on policies, finance, curriculum, and evaluation of the school. They do vote on matters, but their vote serves as advice to the Pastor and School Leadership Team.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

The Holy Spirit Church Finance Council oversees and approves all aspects of the financial status of Holy Spirit Parish which includes Marquette Catholic School. The Finance Council works and exercises authority within the parish finance council guidelines set forth by the Diocese of Duluth and the boundaries set forth in the by-laws of Holy Spirit Church. At Holy Spirit, the Finance Council is comprised of:

The Pastor, who is President/ex-officio and non-voting member (Fr. Brandon Moravitz). The two (2) trustees of Holy Spirit Parish who are chosen by the pastor and serve at his pleasure. Their terms continue at the pastor's discretion. Six (6) at large members are chosen by Father who serve up to two (2) - two (2) year terms. An additional two (2) year term may be added at Father's discretion.

ACADEMIC OVERVIEW

Marquette Catholic School is dedicated to academic excellence....







This past spring MCS hosted its third 8th Grade Graduation and 17 students graduated from Marquette.

STAFF ACADEMIC GOALS

A CONSISTENT DAILY SCHEDULE

- Core classes prioritized to capture uninterrupted learning opportunities
- One unified schedule PreK-8th
- Equitable time for specialists and teacher prep
- Opening & closing the day with homeroom meetings and prayer

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT FOCUSED ON INSTRUCTION

- Reading/writing consultant contracted to implement writing opportunities in all subjects
- Math consultant contracted to support 3rd-8th grade teachers
- Teachers provided with a professional development video library through the Teaching and Learning Channel
- Bi-monthly professional development provided through the Teacher Academy

EVALUATION OF CURRICULUM, INSTRUCTION, AND ASSESSMENT

- Teachers and staff are observed several times a day by the administration team and receive written feedback bimonthly
- Teachers formally evaluated each semester
- Teachers create curriculum plans based on diocesan outcomes; school curriculum review is currently being mapped out
- Student handbook and website being updated to provide information about curriculum and instruction

Marquette Early Learning Center currently serves 32 students. MELC provides a comprehensive curriculum that emphasizes social skills, religion, art, music, literacy, and math, with a strong focus on both indoor and outdoor play. Students have the option to attend 2, 3, or 4 days per week. MELC is licensed yearly through DHS (Department of Human Services).

Our Elementary School Program currently serves 88 students in kindergarten through 4th grade, with one class for each grade level. Core subjects such as literacy and math are taught in the morning, with science and social studies in the afternoon. Each day is enhanced with STEM, art, music, religion, or physical education, with each subject offered once a week. The day concludes with Mass.

Our Middle School Program currently serves 80 students in grades 5-8, with one section for each grade. Core classes in language arts, math, science, and social studies are strategically scheduled every morning. Students attend daily Mass and participate in weekly religion and faith formation through our house system. They also have the option to choose between band, choir, or art. Fifth graders receive additional language arts instruction aligned with state standards, while students in grades 6-8 conclude their day with project-based electives that emphasize critical thinking.

Our Student Support Program aims to meet the needs of all learners. For our K-4 striving learners, support is provided through Title I and small group differentiated instruction. Students in grades 5-8 have several options for support and differentiation in the classroom, along with some tutoring services. Teachers and staff participate in Child Study Teams to implement interventions that support learning and recommend evaluations through the public school system. Students who qualify for special education receive these services through our local public school district.

ACADEMIC ENRICHMENT

FIELD TRIPS

Since 2022, our 8th grade class has had the option to spend a week in Washington DC in May touring the historic sites of our country.

ASSESSMENTS

All Catholic schools in the Diocese of Duluth participate in **NWEA** (North West Educational Assessments) standardized testing three times per year. Teachers carefully analyze the data to determine student interventions and class instructions. This assessment also serves as a tool for caregivers, providing them with clear information on their child's achievement and academic growth.


Among our own MCS students, there was growth from fall to spring for each grade. We are currently comparing our NWEA scores with other diocesan schools (see 3 charts to the right) and we are comparing our NWEA scores with the MCA scores of local public schools (see below right).


Standardized assessments do have their role in planning instruction, but they do not show the full picture of academic life.


- These scores may be affected by rapid guessing, how students feel on the day of the assessment, and student effort.
- Another factor to consider is our small data set compared to a large school. Just a small percentage of students testing low can make a significant impact.
- Attendance of students can be a factor as well. Reviewing last year's attendance records, some students missed a significant number of days.

We compared MCS's 2024 scores with all Catholic schools in our diocese.









Public School Comparisons

INSTRUCTIONAL TIME

MCS operates on a four-day week, from Monday to Thursday, with hours from 7:50 AM-3:15 PM. This is the fifth year of our 4-day week model.


Many schools in NE Minnesota have adopted or are considering the 4-day week model. The Lake Superior School District, which includes Two Harbors and Silver Bay, moved to a four day week the same year as Marquette in 2020-21. Carlton School District, outside of Duluth, moved to a four-day week this 2023-24 school year. St. Louis Public School District, which includes Cherry, Cook, Babbit, Tower, Soudan, and Culver, is currently surveying families and will vote in January on whether or not they will move to a 4 days.

With other school districts considering this shorter week, we want to once again recognize the benefits of this model:

- our families have more rest and time to spend together
- our teachers have more restful weeks
- our teachers have salaries closer to 74% of local public school salaries (when broken down by hour)

While more instructional hours does not always equate to better academics, it is important that we discern and determine the factors that lead to student academic success, and discuss how we are best serving students and families.

Beyond yearly hours however is time is spent on each subject. The leadership team has broken down the minutes by subject, and the new 2024-25 schedule reflects a balance between all subjects.



FAITH LIFE

WHO we teach is just as important as the what, how, and why. We want to teach the unrepeatable HUMAN person that God has created and help each child live a life of holiness and virtue by encountering Jesus Christ every day.

Our "Priest Team" visits our school daily to say Masses, hear confessions, and visit with students. Fr. Daniel Hammer. Fr. Brandon Moravitz, Fr. David Forsman and Fr. Peter Akudugo make up the priest team.

Our Faith Formation Team teaches religion to K-8 once a week. Fr. Daniel Hammer (Associate Pastor), Miss Taylor Mudgett (former FOCUS missionary), and Miss Naomi Ringhand (Holy Spirit Youth Minister) cover the K-8 religious instruction.

Daily Mass is said for all students (10:40am and 2:10pm) and the community is welcome. Older students are trained in being Lectors, Servers, and Sacristans. Mass is 30 minutes this year which allows for more classroom instructional time.

Chapels with the Blessed Sacrament are in both buildings. Teachers and classes have daily access to chapels.

Confession is offered twice a week to students.

Prayer Labs: Middle School students have labs twice a week. This allows students to learn many ways of praying: Adoration, Divine Mercy Chaplet, Rosary, and Lectio Divina (Divine Reading or Praying with Scripture).

Faith Formation for Staff: All MCS staff attend three Diocesan Catechetical Days and an annual retreat. Last year Steve Angrisano led a retreat during Advent. This year the Disciples of our Lord Jesus Christ led the staff retreat at the beginning of November.

We are now in the third year of our house system at Marquette. The house system has been adopted by many Catholic schools to help build community and camaraderie among students and positively reinforce good behavior. The goal of our house system is to cultivate a culture of belonging and leadership in our school family.

- Students are sorted into one of four houses upon entering 5th grade. They stay in that house for the remainder of their time at Marquette, and siblings are sorted into the same houses.
- Each house is led by 2-4 adult mentors, and 2 student leaders (Prefects).
- Houses meet weekly to share 'roses and thorns', pray together, discuss house matters and virtues, plan service projects, and simply connect as a community. Houses come together monthly in "All House" competitions and celebrations such as Spelling Bee, Knowledge Bowl, Track & Field, Talent Competition, and Seder Meal.
- Students are awarded "house points" for virtuous behavior, academic excellence, acts of service, and going above and beyond to help others.
- The house with the most points accumulated throughout the year takes home the St. John Bosco Cup.

LOOKING TO THE FUTURE



All Catholic schools in the Diocese of Duluth are accredited through MNSAA (MN Nonpublic School Accrediting Association). Marquette has been accredited since 1989. (Our preschool program at Marquette is licensed through the Department of Human Services).

This year Marquette will be going through an extensive process to renew our accreditation. This is an opportunity to prayerfully review our current situation and then discern how to make our school stronger. There are 3 steps to this process:

- **FALL (Sept-Dec)**: Gather evidence for all 6 standards (see sidebar) and feedback from the community.
- **WINTER (Jan-Feb):** Based on evidence and feedback, create a School Strategic Plan with specific goals and objectives for the next 5-7 years.
- **SPRING (April 8-10):** Host a site visit where a team of educators will review our school.




